Secretary-General calls on Ministers to use DRR for climate change adaptation

United Nations Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon called a special meeting of Ministers in New York, 29 September, urging them to make greater commitments to using disaster risk reduction for climate change adaptation. The Secretary-General called on Ministers to lead the way at Poznan, Poland, in championing disaster risk reduction as a core element of climate change adaptation. He urged Governments to give high priority to implementing disaster risk reduction measures, in order to achieve the goals set by the Hyogo Framework for Action (2005-2015). "We must not delay," said the Secretary-General. "If we are too slow to adapt to climate change, we risk making disasters even more catastrophic than they need to be. We must draw on the Hyogo Framework for Action and disaster risk reduction knowledge to protect the world's most vulnerable populations against climate change." The meeting also urged substantial scaling up of disaster risk reduction funds at national and international levels in order to reduce the vulnerability of the most affected and the poorest.

African drought forum supports stronger networks

Strengthening networks for knowledge management and information exchange on drought such as the African Drought Risk and Development network (ADDN) was a key focus of the 3rd African Drought Adaptation Forum, which took place in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia from 17-19 September. Through the ADDN, knowledge and good practices in drought risk management are being shared between countries and practitioners in Africa. Recent achievements of the network include the Drought Risk Reduction Framework, which guides actions and national and local level to address drought concerns in development. The drought forum itself was an opportunity to directly share information on the latest methodologies, on-going activities, programmes and networking for drought risk assessment, monitoring, mitigation and preparedness. This included group input into revised editions of several publications: such as the revised version of the UNDP-Drylands Development Centre (DDC) publication Mainstreaming Guidelines: Drylands Development, the revised version of the Drought Risk Reduction: framework and practices, and a forthcoming UNISDR collection of good practices on drought. The event was jointly hosted by UNDP-DDC (Nairobi), UN Economic Commission for Africa and UNISDR Africa. The approximately 80 participants included representatives from governments, donor agencies, the World Bank, the African Union Commission and UN organizations.

IPCC makes moves towards DRR-adaptation report

At the 29th session of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) 31 August - 4 September 2008 in Geneva, Switzerland, parties agreed to hold a scoping workshop on the IPCC Special Report on Managing Extreme Events to Advance Adaptation proposed by Norway and the ISDR system with support from Luxembourg. The workshop will be held in early 2009 and recommend to the IPCC's 30th session whether it should carry out the proposal. The proposal seeks to develop a scientifically sound assessment of information and practices on risk reduction and risk management to support policies and programmes for adaptation to climate change.

DRR networking survey at IDRC Davos conference

A survey of 207 participants at the International Disaster and Risk Conference found that networks outnumbered people in the sample surveyed. Prior to the conference, 46 online networks and communities of practice had been identified and promoted via the disaster risk reduction (DRR) community site PreventionWeb, managed by UNISDR. The preliminary survey results identified 288 additional groups - both private and public - for further validation and study. Few people were connected to the same networks, though the majority indicated an interest in joining groups to facilitate their work. The survey, carried out by UNISDR's PreventionWeb team, aimed to identify new networks and to broker connections between people and networks where needed. After validation, the data will be shared with the Penn State University (USA) COHORT project to further analyze the patterns in the DRR environment. One goal will be to continue the study in similar conference environments to measure future connectedness and the impact of brokering connections.

China and Africa meet to discuss drought risk reduction

The Sino-Africa Forum on Drought Risk Reduction, a joint initiative between the Chinese government and UNISDR, was held on 23 September in Beijing. The main objectives were to share information and knowledge on drought risk reduction and explore ways to further cooperate on the issue. Government officials from China and 12 African countries attended, along with representatives from UNISDR, UNDP, the World Food Programme and the Australian Embassy in China. Compared to other types of disasters, droughts have had a larger negative impact on socio-economic development in both China and Africa. Presentations highlighted the need for a paradigm shift from drought crisis management to drought risk management. Mr Mariga from Zimbabwe encouraged China to share its know-how and experience of managing agricultural drought with African countries and used the expression "Don't give us the fish, but teach us how to fish" to emphasize the need to work towards self-sufficiency. At the Forum's conclusion, participants agreed that more effort is needed to make drought risk reduction an integral component of climate change negotiations, and food security and poverty reduction programmes.

Held in partnership with the United Nations Environment Programme, it mobilizes an estimated 35 million people across 120 countries. Participants are able to map and promote their organizations and clean up activities on the campaign website. Resources are also available to help participants plan and organize activities.



Education alliances for DRR growing in the Americas

A workshop on “Building Alliances for the Strengthening of the Education Sector in Disaster Risk Reduction” was held in Lima, Peru, from 9 - 11 September. Participants included representatives from the regional Education Ministry, agencies and NGOs. The workshop identified a list of joint activities to be undertaken with the aim of building regional alliances for strengthening education sector capacity in disaster preparedness, risk reduction and response. The group supported the UNISDR proposal to set up a thematic platform on Education and Disaster Risk Reduction in the region. Work will be ongoing to formalize this commitment and define the platform structure. UNICEF, Prevention and Mitigation in the African Community (PREDECAN), USAID's Office of U.S. Foreign Disaster Assistance, Save the Children, the Intermediate Technology Development Group and UNISDR co-organized the workshop.


